REGULAR SESSION MINUTES March 10, 2015

Chair Gene J. Concordia called the Regular Session of the Board of Trustees of Rowan College at Gloucester County to order at 6:30 p.m. in the annex of the main dining room.

Trustee Ruby Love read the Open Public Meetings Act Statement: "In compliance with the 'Open Public Meetings Act' of the State of New Jersey, adequate notice of this meeting of the Rowan College at Gloucester County Board of Trustees was provided by the forwarding of a notice on November 18, 2014, to the *South Jersey Times*, the *Courier Post*, the Gloucester County Freeholder Director and Education Liaison, the Gloucester County Administrator, and the College Community." Trustee Love then led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chair Concordia welcomed everyone and acknowledged Ms. Jessica Jolly, Faculty representative, and Mr. Lyman Barnes, Freeholder Education Liaison. Mr. Concordia then asked to move forward with the presentation portion of the agenda.

PRESENTATION

President Keating introduced Ms. Patricia Claghorn, Dean of Business Studies, who gave a presentation on the Business Studies division's accomplishments as well as an update. Dean Claghorn then introduced:

- Cooperative Education Instructor Darlene Berger and a business student who spoke of her valuable internship experience; and
- Business partner Thomas Iacavone, Vice President of Art Guild Inc. in West Deptford, who praised the quality of the RCGC internship program and described it as a win-win for the college and business.

Dean Claghorn closed the presentation with thanks to the faculty, staff, student and business partner for attending tonight. Chair Concordia expressed appreciation for a job well done and also acknowledged and thanked the faculty and staff that were in attendance.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Keating presented the 2016 budget (power point attached). He emphasized that the budget was put together with affordability and accessibility in mind and that all aspects of spending are attached to goals and objectives of the Strategic Plan. He acknowledged Dominick Burzichelli, Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, and Elizabeth Hall, Executive Director, Financial Services and their staff for doing an outstanding job putting the budget together.

At 7:35 p.m., a ten minute recess took place.

ACCEPTANCE OF MINUTES

Chair Concordia declared the February 10, 2015 Regular Session meeting minutes and the February 10, 2015 Closed Session meeting minutes approved as presented.

REPORTS

1. Student Services

At the request of Chair Concordia, Ms. Judith Atkinson, Vice President of Student Services, gave a report of happenings in the Student Services division and invited all to the RCGC Open House which was rescheduled to March 19 due to snow.

2. Finance

At the request of Trustee Douglas Wills, Ms. Elizabeth Hall, Executive Director, Financial Services, gave an update on the College's finances.

- a. <u>Statement: Month Ending January 31, 2015</u> Information: The Monthly Operating Report of revenues and expenditures was presented to the Board (attached).
- b. Revised FY2015 Operating Budget
 On the recommendation of the President, Mr. Wills made a motion, seconded by Mr.
 Daws and unanimously passed, to approve a revised FY2015 operating budget in the amount of \$39,106,085 as the official College budget for the fiscal year (attached).
- c. <u>Tuition and Fees Schedule effective Fall 2015</u>
 On the recommendation of the President, Mr. Wills made a motion, seconded by Ms. DuBois and unanimously passed, to approve the tuition and fee schedule effective Fall 2015 (attached)

d. FY2016 Operating Budget

On the recommendation of the President, Mr. Wills made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Love and unanimously passed, to approve the FY2016 operating budget in the amount of \$40,930,569 as the official College budget for the fiscal year (attached).

e. FY2016 Capital Budget Chapter 12

On the recommendation of the President, Mr. Wills made a motion, seconded by Ms. DuBois and unanimously passed, to approve the FY2016 \$3,000,000 capital projects budget ("Chapter 12") as the official College capital projects budget ("Chapter 12") for the fiscal year (attached).

3. Facilities/Property

At the request of Trustee Jean DuBois, Mr. Dominick Burzichelli, Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, gave an update on construction projects and thanked the Board for approving the 2016 Capital Budget Chapter 12 funds. Trustee DuBois then proceeded with the following Facilities/Property item:

a. <u>Bid Waiver Contract Award</u>: *Bellia Office Furniture Company*On the recommendation of the President, Ms. DuBois made a motion, seconded by Mr. Daws and unanimously passed, to award a contract to Bellia Office Furniture Company to provide furnishings for the Adult Center for Transition building in the amount of \$86,168.80.

4. Academic & Student Services

At the request of Trustee James Lavender, Dr. Linda Martin, Vice President of Academic Services, provided an academic services update (report attached). Trustee Lavender then proceeded with the following items:

a. Approval to Apply and Upon Award, Approval to Accept and Sign: Center for Family Services

On the recommendation of the President, Dr. Lavender made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Scott and unanimously passed, to approve a resolution granting the Center for People in Transition permission to apply for and upon award, approval to accept and sign for funding from the Center for Family Services for the Displaced Homemakers program and Victims of Domestic Violence for the period of October 1, 2015 – September 30, 2018 in the amount of \$10,350.

b. Approval to Appoint and Reappoint: Gloucester County Cultural & Heritage Commission

On the recommendation of the President, Dr. Lavender made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Love and unanimously passed, to approve a resolution to appoint Gregory Murphy and reappoint Steven Glenn Jones and Ingres Simpson to the Gloucester County Cultural & Heritage Commission.

5. Personnel

a. Personnel Actions:

On the recommendation of the President, Mrs. Scott made a motion, seconded by Ms. DuBois and unanimously passed, to approve the Education/General Fund Actions as listed on the attached and to approve a 2.25 percent increase for non-represented full-time and permanent part-time employees effective 7/1/2015. Grant funded employees may be eligible for an increase, depending on the conditions of the grant.

Grant funded employees shall not receive salary increases in excess of amounts approved for other employees. This increase does not apply to student worker or work study categories.

6. Other

a. Board of Trustees

Trustee James Lavender reported on the Community College National Legislative Summit he attended in February, 2015. In accordance with Board Policy 1021, Freeholder Liaison Barnes was informed of Dr. Lavender's plans to attend the summit and Trustee Lavender was requested to give a presentation upon his return outlining his experience at the conference (report attached).

b. Board of Trustees

Trustee Virginia Scott thanked all for the rededication of the Scott Hall STEM Center building. She then commended the women for all of the outstanding work they do in recognition of March being Women's History Month.

STATEMENT OF FACT:

The Board is requested to approve a revised Fiscal Year 2015 operating budget for the College in the amount of \$39,106,085.

BACKGROUND:

As shown on the attached pages, the proposed FY 2015 operating budget calls for anticipated unrestricted revenue (including a reserve for capital projects, a reserve from the FY14 budget, and the usage of funds from the College's unrestricted fund balance) totaling \$39,106,085 and appropriated unrestricted expenses of \$39,106,085. The budget includes pension and health benefit increases, continued funding of approved positions at contracted rates, as well as the continuation of current vendor contracts.

PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend approving the proposed FY 2015 operating budget as shown on the attached pages as the official College budget for the fiscal year.

Tuition and Fee Schedule effective Fall

2015

BACKGROUND:

Attached for Board consideration is a Tuition and Fee schedule effective with the Fall semester 2015. The Board is asked to consider increasing from \$95 to \$97 per credit hour the tuition charge with the required general service fee per credit hour to increase to \$38.50 from \$34.50. The capital construction fee will remain the same at \$2 per credit hour. This will bring the total tuition and standard fees to \$137.50 per credit hour resulting in an annual increase of \$180 for a full-time student. Other fees may

apply as appropriate.

Re: 2015 Community College National Legislative Summit Brief

The Annual ACCT Legislative Summit was held on February $10^{th}-12^{th}$ at the Marriott Wardman Park Hotel in Washington D.C. The Summit was aimed at providing professional development for trustees and college presidents from all 50 states while updating participants on federal legislative priorities. The New Jersey Council of Community Colleges (N.J.CCC) was represented and several meetings were held in an effort to assist participants with understanding N.J.'s legislative priorities as well as establishing opportunities to advocate on behalf of our Community Colleges. The week began with the New Trustee Academy on February 9^{th} , and concluded with meetings on Capital Hill with our State's Senators and Representatives.

Summary

Below is a more detailed description of each event and activity. However, for the sake of brevity, there were a few benefits as a result of my attendance.

- Gained a better understanding of the role of a Board Trustee and developed a new appreciation for the community colleges
- Apprised of the national conversation with respect to the unique role community colleges play in our educational and economic systems
- Established relationships with community college advocates
- Learned of national plans to support community colleges
- Gained a better understanding of the national accountability movement

- Gained a better understanding of the legislative priorities and how they relate to our citizenry with respect to access, affordability, and educational attainment
- Had the privilege of representing RCGC, a community college on the move and cited in Mr. Norcross' opening remarks before the N.J. Delegation
- Used my perspective as a K-12 superintendent and experience as a trustee to enrich the dialogue with congressional figures, White House staff, fellow trustees and presidents, and etc.

I have included below a more detailed account of the Summit's events and my experiences.

New Trustee Academy

This was a full day orientation regarding the roles and responsibilities of Community College Trustees. Approximately 50 new (newer) trustees, presidents, and chancellors attended the Academy and about 15 states were represented. The orientation covered a range of topic from Boardmanship 101 to advocacy on the national level. Other topics included: Leadership transition; Accountability; Funding and resources; Measuring student outcomes/success; History of community colleges; Parliamentary Procedure; and, Key Elements to Successful Trusteeship. Several guest speakers shared their knowledge and experience with the group and included host Narcisa Polonio, Executive Vice President, Jee Hang Lee, Director of Public Policy, Brad Young, President & CEO of Maryland Financial Planners, Kent Phillippe, Associate Vice President, and Jack Stripling, Senior Reporter, The Chronicle of Higher Education.

Key Takeaways

- **Leadership Exodus** More than 600 college presidents (there are approximately 1,200 community colleges) have changed hands in the last 24 months. That's approximately 50% of our Nation's Community College leaders. Boards need to be prepared to compete and hold on to a good president.
- Board Turnover Pay attention to board member turnover and take measures to ensure smooth
 transitions. How outgoing and incoming trustees are treated reflects the values of the Board. Have
 in place rituals that celebrate the contributions of outgoing trustees and welcome input from new
 trustees. Key reminder: each time a member of the board transitions, you are operating with a
 "new" Board. The dynamics, relationships, perceptions, and energy of the Board all change every
 time.
 - New Board Member Orientation Programs help to create an environment that fosters and maintains board cohesiveness.
 - Share with the public the credentials of a new trustee at their first meeting.
 - Hold a formal swearing-in ceremony to underscore the importance of the new role assumed by the trustee.
 - o Prepare a 'welcome packet' for new trustees that include key financial documents, meeting schedules, parking information, trustee job description, annual reports, etc.
- Changing Demographics Trustees need to be apprised of the changing demographics. Our Nation
 is experiencing a growth in the Hispanic and female populations; African American males
 demonstrate low attendance at community college; Growing disparity between traditional and
 adult learners.
- *Accountability* A need to focus on outcomes; economic and labor market impact; performance-based funding' and state & federal mandates.
- Future Trends in Higher Education Workforce training (high demand for precision manufacturing); public funding; enrollment decline has stabilized; performance based funding; increase baccalaureate conferring institutions; increasing diversity; leadership exodus.
- *Trustees should exemplify ethical behavior*; endeavor to remain always accountability to the community; honestly debate the issues but speak as one voice on decisions/policy; be prepared for each meeting and to debate issues openly; turn off cell phones.
- **N.J. Community Colleges** Enroll more than 400,000 students at over 70 campuses throughout the State. Community Colleges now enroll over 60% of all undergraduates in N.J. public colleges.

Legislative Priorities

- Legislative Priorities for FY 2015 include: (Se N.J.CC Federal Legislative Priorities attached). You can also go to the N.J.CCC website for information on Federal and State legislative priorities. http://www.N.J.ccc.org/professional-resources/legislative-priorities/
 - The Pell Grant Program Provide adequate funding to support inflationary increases to the Pell Grant maximum award without limiting eligibility. Restore the year-round Pell Grant, reinstate full eligibility for "ability-to-benefit" students, and extend lifetime Pell eligibility to 14 full-time equivalent semesters. This is both an ACCT & N.J.CCC Legislative Priority.
 - Note: More than 3 million low- and moderate-income community college students receive Pell Grants each year. The grants reach more than one-third of all community college students.

- In N.J., 86,000 community college students received over \$270 million in Pell funding.
- Higher Education Act (HEA) Reauthorization Reauthorize HEA to support community college access and success by improving student aid programs, ensuring accurate and complete measurements of student success, reducing burdens, and improving institutional support. Priorities of reauthorization include:
 - Loans Revise current borrowing limits to better reflect the needs of students in associate and certificate programs.
 - Transparency & Reporting Develop accountability measurements that accurately
 reflect community college student success, including transfer rates. And, develop a
 national unit record data system to effectively track students.
 - Adequate State Funding Allow student access to Title IV funding for workforce oriented short programs.
- Carl D. Perkins Career & Technical Education (CTE) Act Reauthorization Reauthorize
 CTE to maintain flexibility, allowing community colleges to address local needs while
 strengthening CTE programs. This is both an ACCT & N.J.CCC Legislative Priority.
 - N.J. currently receives over \$9 million in Perkins funding through community colleges.
- Community College & Veteran Students Enhance the role community colleges play in serving veterans and active duty service members. Services should include comprehensive counseling and services, as well as accurate and useful information about educational options.
- Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors (DREAM) Act Pass the DREAM Act, including access to federal student aid.
- Higher Education Tax Provisions Streamline current higher education tax benefits to support an expanded American Opportunity Tax Credit (AOTC).
- Extend the Trade Adjustment Assistance Act Community College & Career Training Grant (TAACCCT) Program - The \$2 billion TAACCCT Program expired in 2014, after four years of competitive grant offerings. Funding has helped generate cooperative agreements among a wide-range of institutions and businesses.
- America's College Promise Proposal: Federal Support for Community College Tuition –
 President Obama stands to increase access, affordability, and success for our Nation's
 community colleges. This would in turn generate substantial economic and social benefits
 for America. This is both an ACCT & N.J.CCC Legislative Priority.

Here are a few things to consider:

- The federal government has shifted from Pell Grants to student loans over the last decade. Today, college debt makes up 6% of all federal debt and the average student graduates with more than \$26,000 in student loans. Ten percent of students graduate with more than \$40,000 in student loans. When you take into consideration the underemployment of college graduates, student debt is having catastrophic economic impact (reduction in discretionary income, diversion of monies earmarked for retirement plans.)

 - Despite relatively low tuitions, financial obstacles continue to create barriers for many Americans.
- One-third of Community College students work full-time in order to generate the financial resources necessary to attend school.

- Dramatically lowering tuition would incentivize a new group of students to attend community college.
- Establishment of the program would make Community College as accessible as high school.
- This program would be "first dollar" funding, reducing tuition and allowing students to use federal student financial aid and other aide to cover the costs of books, supplies, equipment, etc.
- Would include accurate measurements of community college performance, which are lacking in Federal law, and incorporate into HEA.
- A portion of funds would be made available to colleges to assist students by providing critical services. (i.e. academic counseling, support).
- States would be required to maintain current levels of funding support for higher education and student financial aid programs.

Advocacy

- About half of the 6.5 million credit-seeking college students attend community colleges. The
 average age of community college students is 29 and approximately 2/3 of students attend parttime. (AACC)
 - o In N.J., 249,000 credit students attend 19 community colleges. 148,000 attend as noncredit or workforce training students. (N.J.CSS Facts)
 - o 60 percent of all undergraduate students in N.J.s public colleges/universities attended community college. (N.J.CC Facts)
 - 38 percent of all students who earn a bachelor's degree from a N.J. college/university completed courses at a community college.
- Celebrate community college stories; tell your story if possible. For example: Tom Hanks recently penned an op-ed for the NY Times (1/14/15) entitled, "I Owe It All to Community College." (Chabot College, Hayward, Calif.). He summed up his experience at the community college this way, "That place made me what I am today." http://www.nytimes.com/2015/01/14/opinion/tom-hanks-on-his-two-years-at-chabot-college.html
- We need to tell the community our stories for many Americans spent time at a community college.
 Here is a short list: Ross Perot, George Lucas, Tom Hanks, Billy Crystal, Black & Decker CEO Nolan Archibald, Sarah Palin, Nolan Ryan, Media Personality Jim Lehrer, Walt Disney, Eddie Murphy, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Jackie Robinson, Clint Eastwood
- Why Advocate? Enhance and protect community colleges; pressure lawmakers for the good of the community; establish positive two-way relationships.
- Most effective way to advocate? Bring students with you or share stories from students; followed by personal letter writing.
- How did we advocate during the ACCT Summit? Each state was paired with their individual
 senators and representatives and meetings were prearranged on Capital hill. The Presidents of
 Atlantic and Cumberland Community Colleges joined me when we met with Congressman
 LoBiondo's Chief of Staff at his office. (Please note Congressman LoBiondo was called to the floor to
 vote during our meeting).
 - We advocated for a number of the priorities listed above but focused our discussion on the need to reinstate "year-round" Pell Grants, reauthorization of the HEA, and to streamline the federal student aid application process (FAST).

Who lent their voice to the cause on behalf of our Nation's Community Colleges?

- Dr. Jill Biden, Second Lady of the United States and a current community college professor of English in Northern Virginia. A strong advocate for community college. She said today is a new day for community colleges and she is a champion for the cause. She encouraged the President to host our firs Community College Summit at the White House (2010) and credited her grandmother, a former teacher, for inspiring her love of reading. Dr. Biden first began teaching as a reading specialist in a high school and is using her national profile to create opportunities for others. She said, "Teaching is who she is, not what she does" and "education breaks down barriers." She also reminded us that the responsibility to educate our students belongs to all of us and our Community Colleges are in a unique position to assist.
- Thomas E. Perez, U.S. Labor Secretary A century ago people thought going to high school was a waste of time and money. Today, you need more than a high school diploma. For many jobs, American's don't have the adequate skills to take these jobs. Currently, there are 5 million job vacancies, but we need to up-skill the labor force. The Community College plays a critical role in this. He advocated for strengthening our Apprenticeship Programs, as we cannot afford to invest in our future workforce. Perez compared our programs to Germany and we don't' measure up. In Germany Apprenticeship Programs are sacred and, as a result, unemployment is much lower. Perez hears from the business world all of the time that our labor pool is simply inadequate. Perez also brought attention to a \$100 million grant competition, which was announced in Phila., to ensure women and minorities gain access. Currently 150 community colleges are signed up. "Perez made the announcement in Philadelphia, where he touted a successful apprenticeship program that equips students to be information technology professionals jobs that can land graduates of the program starting salaries of \$50,000 or above." - Ted Mitchell, U.S. Under Secretary of Education Wants to create a framework for evaluating our
 community colleges. Wants this to be a Rating (not Ranking) system. This is to be done to highlight
 the best but it is not intended to be punitive. Limitations of such a system would include transfers
 in/out. There will be a number of iterations and expect the first to come out spring/summer 2015.
- James Kvaal (Kwol), Deputy Director for White House Domestic Policy Council Advocated for the President's America's Promise Proposal. The President has drawn parallels to the high school movement a century ago and as a result of that movement our Nation saw an increase in educational attainment. By the 1950s the U.S.A. outpaced Europe 3:1 with respect to educational attainment. Today, it's widely believed that we are standing still. American education is at a crossroads and only 1/3 of funding of Pell Grant goes to community colleges. He also cited median family income fell after accounting for inflation and since costs go up, our middle class continue to fall behind. How can they better themselves? The American's Promise Proposal is built off of Chicago and Tennessee Plans and the aim is that our community colleges will operate as an extension of high school. Is it important to the populous? The announcement was released via video and it generated 8 million views, a record at the time.
- Congressman Donald Norcross, (D-NJ) The junior congressman from N.J. represented our state
 and the 1st district very well. An eloquent speaker and advocate for the community college
 legislative agenda shared his personal story, attending Camden County Community College with his
 mother.
- Senator Dick Durbin (D-IL) another eloquent and charismatic speaker who advocated the community college's legislative agenda. He refers to private four-year colleges and universities as "predatory" schools who capitalize on huge marketing budgets to saddle American students with too much debt. Can a 19-year-old student really assess how much debt he/she can take on? He also challenged the high cost of text books and said "56% of students don't buy them; 95% believe they are too expensive." In today's world of Kindle and Nook why are we not doing things differently?
- Congressman Gwen Moore (D-Wi) She said advocacy in D.C. works and applauded our efforts for doing so. Criticized the federal government for not keeping up with Pell Grant funding. She also

- stated that many jobs in American are not exportable (i.e. nurses) and 10,000 Americans turn 65 daily, and this will continue for the next 15 years. *Is our next generation of workers ready?* We need to reach out to everyone and cannot afford for our veterans, 1st generation college students, and the poor not to access Community College. Applauded POTUS' push for free community college.
- Congressman Joaquin Castro (D-TX) Raised issues with developmental education and called it a
 disaster and adds to the Higher Education graveyard. Students need to be prepared when they step
 foot on the college campus and high school exit exams should be adequate enough for students to
 avoid the no aid/no credit basic skills classes. Also advocated for universal preschool and STEM
 programs in P-12 as programs to better prepare our students. Also advocated for counselors at the
 community college level.
- Congressman Bill Flores, (R-TX) Said, "education is where life happens." Veteran unemployment stands at 7.9%, higher when compared to the national unemployment rate of 5.9%. Said, rather than focus on funding America's Promise, we need to focus on growing the economy, as there are not enough jobs. Also advocated for helping veterans citing the Veteran's Opportunity Act and GI Bill Veteran's Act. Closed by saying the 114th Congress' Goals are: Grow the American Economy; Fix drivers of debt (not necessarily the Pell Grant); Rebuild National Security (Build strength through peace; "if you are the biggest kid on the block, no one will mess with you."); And as Chairman of the Republican Study Committee (A caucus of 170 conservative members of the Republican Party which has always called for significant cuts in non-defense spending).
