### **Catalog Description**

This course will provide an overview of the legal and ethical principles needed for health care workers to give competent and compassionate care to clients. Legal and Ethical Issues in Health Care will allow students to develop skills and information literacy through critical-thinking activities, teamwork, collaboration, and a hands-on approach to learning. The goal for this course will be to provide students with the legal and ethical tools to utilize in building understanding and working toward the resolution of problems that is within acceptable legal and ethical boundaries.

- 7. **Historical Perspective:** Students will understand historical events and movements in World, Western, non-Western or American societies and assess their subsequent significance.
- 8. **Global and Cultural Awareness:** Students will understand the importance of a global perspective and culturally diverse peoples.
- 9. Ethical Reasoning and Action: Students will understand ethical issues and situations.
- 10. **Information Literacy:** Students will address an information need by locating, evaluating, and effectively using information.
